INTRODUCTION

William Litten was a ship's fiddler in George the Third's Royal Navy in the first years of the nineteenth century. The Royal Navy often included a musician in the crew, presumably for the entertainment and exercise of the crew as well as synchronising thetiming of some of the heavier manual work. Where the merchant ships had a chanteyman the Royal Navy of this period had an official musician usually a fiddler.

What makes Litten remarkable amongst his peers was his ability to transcribe music. In the years 1800 to 1802 he was aboard the HMS Gorgon, part of the British India Fleet, leaving England in May 1800, visiting the settlement at Port Jackson, then arriving in China in February 1801 and passing through St Helena in 1802. During the voyage he wrote down much, perhaps all, of his repertoire. Thus giving us a unique snapshot of the musical and, in particular, the fiddle repertoire of his time.

The original manuscript is in the library of the Dukes County Historical Society in Edgartown, Massachusetts, on the Island of Martha's Vineyard, where it was found by Gale Huntington. Huntington (1901-1993) was a noted regional collector of folklore and history, best known for his work on the folk music and songs of whalemen, and the regional music of southeastern New England. He did a fine job of interpreting Litten's handwritten notes in the manuscript book but says that "the tunes themselves were transcribed without too much difficulty, for Litten was a good musician." Some tunes were edited lightly. The collection was originally published by Hines Point Publishers in 1977, with notes about each tune as written down by Litten and compared to other versions of the period.

All that is known about Litten is derived from the disjointed notes crowded onto the pages of the manuscript and the inside of the front and back covers. The notes are hard to decipher because of Litten's poor spelling and writing and due to ink sometimes faded and sometimes bled through the paper. Huntington says "about William Litten himself we know very little. We do not know even whether he was English, Scottish, Irish or American. There are some very good Irish tunes in the book and some equally good Scottish and English ones. However Litten did not seem to care too much for the typically Scottish dotted eighth and sixteenth note combination. In fact, some of his Scottish tunes play like Irish versions of them."

I was given a photocopy of some of the material by fellow collector and musician, Don Brian, and in 2006 presented a workshop on the material at the Australian National Folk Festival in Canberra. Through the National Library of Australia a copy of Huntington's book was obtained by inter-library loan. A reproduction of the original book was produced for the workshop, and a basic recording of the tunes played through once each by Jessica Randall was provided. James Johnson arranged chordal accompaniment for the tunes.

This extract is a personal selection of 40 of the tunes arranged into compatible sets.

William Litten has vanished from the historical record, but his collection of music remains as his ongoing legacy.
